A penalty kick was awarded and Sutherland was deputed to take it. He kicked straight at Williams, who saved magnificently, and the Luton custodian behaved equally well immediately after. When Stewart had troubled the Swindon keeper with a fast long one, Sutherland once more broke away, the result being a corner, from which Williams made another grand save. Both sides broke the off-side rule, and subsequently Coupar was injured. In the operations that followed the home forwards gave a good display and many times they looked like increasing the lead. Nothing further was scored and thus the Lutonians became the first Southern League team to beat swindon with the following totals :
