The first point of interest after the resumption was a neat advance by the Wellingborough lot, the effect of this being spoiled by one of the forwards getting off-side. The Wellingborough men seemed greatly dissatisfied with the decision and manifested a disinclination to resume; but Mr. Crisp acted promptly and after some apparent unpleasantness operations were resumed.
