"Wellingborough had most of the game in the opening of the second half, but were again and again repelled. When the visitors got away they were a source of trouble to the home defence. All length Gilacher scored a second goal, but Ekins should have been given offside jus: previously. Towards the floish the homesters made very determined efforts, and at one time it looked any odds upon their scoing. The excitement was intense, and shots were rained in at Williams, who saved in marvellous style. He brought off one save in a manner that has never before been seen at Wellingborough.
