way. After a good effort by Foulstone and Soott. McCartney kicked away a shot from Foxhall, and a moment later Webster netted the ball, but was given offside. Luton then got going, but the right wing was pulled up by Munro and from a foul against the visitors. Webster succeeded in scoring the first goal for the Trinity with a splendid overhead kick. This was after ten minutes' play, but the reverse seemed to have an inspiriting effect upon Luton, and a long, flying shot from Gallacher landed on

penalty kick given against his side, Pumfrey handling a shot from Little. Bayley took Bagshaw's place, and the latter,

after stopping to see Little make the scores equal from the penalty, left the field, Bayley remaining in goal. Luton endeavoured to make the most of their opportunity, and kept the Trinity busy defending until the interval, but thanks chiefly to

the brilliant efforts of Pumfrey and Munro, they were unable to score, the teams changing ends with the soors at two goals all.

When play was resumed, Morris sook upon himself the duties of custodian, and Wismore dropped back to centre-half. From the kick-off, Unimborough went straight shead, and forced three corners in succession, but could not turn them to account, though Munro had hard luck in hitting the post. Luton replied, Gallacher showing up very finely, and Pumfrey and Bayley were for a time kept very hard at work, whilst Foulstone found McInnes and Ekins quite as big a handful as he could manage.

Still, the goals would not come, and eventually the Trinity turned the tide of battle, but when they got by the backs they found their efforts defied by Williams, whose exhibition was, as a local writer remarks, "a perfect treat." The play was very fast, the ball being trundled from one end to the other with great rapidity, and at last, there was a terrific sommage in the mouth of the Luton goal, the ball ultimately being fisted away by McEwen as he fell to the ground.

A penalty was awarded, and Munro scored with a shot which gave Williams no chance. Thus Gainsborough once more obtained the lead. They were not destined to keep it for long, however, Gallacher almost immediately getting in a good run and a well-judged centre. The homesters cleared from this, but Gallacher was not to be denied, and a moment afterwards equalised with a magnificent oblique shot from the touch-line, the custodian having no chance whatever.

After this, Luton made a splendid and prolonged attempt to secure the winning point, and the home defence was sorely taxed. It looked any odds on Luton doing the trick, but eventually they were driven back, and a terrific shot from Webster went behind off McEwen. Nothing came of the corner, or of several shots which followed, and from now to the finish Luton peppered away at the Gainsborough goal. Once Coupar had a grand opening, but sent just the wrong side of the upright, and the game ended in a draw of three goals all.

Although Luton ought to have bagged the two points, the gain of one was as creditable as it was unexpected, and the fact that they scored three goals against a defence which had only been previously pierced once—I am referring to the home matches, of course—speaks volumes for the strength of their attack.

Perhaps among the forwards most praise is due to Gallacher, who played a really fine game. The other men did well, and the defence was good, though occasionally the tactics employed were a trifle too vigorous. Gainsborough were in their usually brilliant form, and on the whole. Luton may think themselves fairly fortunate that they were not added to their list of victims. It is certain that Luton have done what few other teams will do, that is, taken three points out of them.
