LUTON v. GAINSBOROUGH.

A FINE VICTORY.

Luton paid a successful visit to Lincolnshire on Saturday, and came home with two League points from Northolme, Gainsborough, where last year they made a draw of 3 goals each. The match was played in delightful weather, and before about 2,000 spectators. In the home team Richardson, the reserve goal-keeper, took the place of Copeland. Luton: Perkius; Dow and Moore; C. Ford,

Sharpe, and Hewitt; Darrant, McInnes, Kemplay, W. Ford, and Brock.

Gainsborough: Richardson; Bayley, and Pumfrey; Foulstone, Morris, and Munro;

Wigmore, Walters, Scott, Hughes, and Foxall. Referee: Mr. Cowley. Munro won the toss, but on starting Luton at once forced matters, and were highly dangerous from a free kick close to the Trinity goal. Several warm shots were sent in, and Kemplay

beat Richardson, but was given off side. This exciting start showed that the Lutonians meant business, and great relief was experienced when the home front rank got away. Wigmore made a couple of characteristic dashes, and sent in a pretty oblique shot from long range, which Perkins got to in the corner of the goal and threw away. Foxall was next conspicuous, but was stopped for off-side, and a foul against him

smartly, Wigmore just missing a lovely centre from Foxall; while a foul against the visitors immediately afterwards brought no good result. The game was being very evenly contested, the defence on both sides being well tried, but the Luton front rank showed up the better of the two. After 20 minutes' play the locals got well up the field, and a neat pass to Hughes enabled that player to easily open the scoring for Gains-
