LUTON v. GRIMSBY.

A WELCOME VICTORY.

Having defeated the Arsenal at Grimsby the previous week, the Fishermen came to Luton on Saturday with fair confidence. They stopped over-night at Peterborough, and found a gusty afternoon awaiting them in Bedfordshire. The locals were inspirited by their success at Blackpool, and had also the recollection of Grimsby's defeat at Luton on their last visit by 6-0. About 2,000 spectators were present and Mr. J. E. Carpenter, of Leicester, refereed with the following teams:—

Grimsby kicked off against the wind and Jenkinson showed up with a smart centre, which Williams headed out close on Perkins. Then after a series of throws-in owing to the rough breeze, Griffiths centred and Greenwood missed only two yards in front of the Luton goal. The first attack by the home team was initiated by Durrant, who, however, ran the ball over the goal-lines. Grimsby missed again, but a foul by C. Ford enabled Griffiths to score

their first goal after only 7 minutes' play.

Luton looked like retaliating from a corner, but Durrant placed behind. The local rightwinger centred beautifully and Kemplay headed hard into goal, where Bagshaw smartly fisted the ball away. A foul by Mountain laid out Hewitt rather badly, and he had to rest for some minutes. After a corner to Grimsby, Ekins made a good run, but Kemplay and McInnes both missed his centre, while Durrant's shot "cannoned" out. Bagshaw, however, had to save in quick time, with two Luton forwards on top of him. The Fishermen did some pressing, but 24 minutes from the start Luton made an unexpected spurt. Thanks to hard work by Ekins, who sent across a fine centre, the Luton forwards bore down upon Bagshaw with a dashing onslaught, and Durrant scored with a lovely oblique shot from the corner-flag. Loud cheers greeted this welcome "equaliser."

Luton, who gave Bagshaw a severe test directly afterwards. Grimsby paid a stray visit to Perkins, but the old Kettering custodian kicked up the field. From this, Ekins raced away and centred right across to Durrant, who scored No. 2 with a brilliant run, only 8 minutes after the previous score, and elicited enthusiastic applause.
