The visitors were giving the Luton delenders some anxious moments, and Hawkes had to clear a fine centre from Barcock, which he did in able style. The Luton team then had a turn, and Plummer made a good try, but the ball just went over the bar. The visiting forwards took up the attack again, and Turner mis-kicking, Rothwell opened the score in very easy fashion through Pridmore. The home team now set up a strong attack upon the visitors' citadel, but Rothwell defended stoutly, and owing to bad shooting of the home forwards, Brampton was not seriously troubled. The Rothwell forwards continued to worry the home defence, and Smart had to clear from Dixon, while directly after Barcock was cantioned for fouling Smart. A foul against Ellingham was shot over the bar by Gibson from the kick, and Luton, going to the other end, forced a corner off Fridmore, but the ball was cleared. A foul against Luton was fruitless, and Hawkes had hard lines in not scoring with a fine shot which just skimmed the bar. Coming again, however, Luton took advantage of some fine forcing play by Ellingham, and equalised the scores, Barker beating Brampton with a fine shot. The visitors forced a corner on the kick off, but it was got away, and a long drive by Barker went behind. Hawkes cleared well from Willis, and a good stempt by the visiting forwards was spoilt by Dixon being given offside. Another corner of a fine centre by Dimmock, and Brampton sweed finely from Plummer and Barker in succession. Dixon made a nice run, but the ball was put behind, and offside against Barcock nullified a good goal got by Tridmore. Smart gave a corner to Cross, but nothing tangible resulted.
