LUTON TOWN v. SWINDON.

LUTON JUST WIN. The return match between these elevens

should have taken place on Jan. 5th, but Luton were engaged in the English Cup on that date. For a consideration of £10 Swindon consented to fill the open date thus left on Saturday for the return game in the above League. When the teams formerly met, Swindon won by 2 goals to 1, and Luton were anxious to reverse this verdict. The visitors are not over strong, although they have accomplished the deteat of Southampton and have drawn with Tottenham Hotspur this season.

Saxton appeared once more in the home team,

and Cox played vice Holdstock at centre half, the visitors being at full strength. The Luton team appeared with black armlets as mourning for the Queen. The weather was fine, but a strong wind was blowing, and only 1500 spectators turned out to witness the encounter. By a curious mist ke on the part of the League committee, there were two referees on the ground to officiate – Mr. F. S. Walford and Mr. J. Stark,—the latter eventually having charge of the following 22:

The home team returned to the attack again, and Durrant put over a good centre by Saxton, and Menham saved finely from Durrant and Saxton in succession. The visitors caused the Luton de enders to be very smart in clearing on several occasions, and from one of their breaks-away while Luton were vainly appealing for offside, Kirton ran t rough and equalised the scores with a very tame shot.

A foul against McCurdy was cleared, and Menham saved marvellously from Saxton from a centre by Durrant. Luton claimed a goal on the ground of having taken the ball over the line, but the referee ignored their appeal. The visiting custodian saved in masterly fashion on several occasions. NOTES.

The game was rather tame. Ord in goal, was in his usual form, but he was not severely tested. McCurdy played well at back, and stopped the visitors right wing in fine style on several occasions. White also played a good game although he mis-kicked once or twice.

Of the half-backs, Cliff rd played a sound game, and was about the best player on the field. Cox was not a success, and has much to learn. Williams played effectively as usual. The forwards lacked combination, and their shooting was poor.

Gray in the centre, has not yet shown his capabilities, but he got hurt during the game and was not much good for playing in the second half. However, his first goal for Luton proved to be the winning point. Tierney played well, but is inclined to be tricky, and neglect his partners. Saxton, Blessington, and Durrant all played well together.

Menham, for the visitors, effected some marvellous saves during the game. He is a very big fellow, clears his lines in fine style, and was repeatedly applauded. At back, Ritchie defende i splendidly, very well assisted by Stephenson.

McEleney and Downie both showed good form, as did Richardson, but he had a warm handful in Tierney. Of the forwards, Kirton was the best, and he is the fastest man in the team.

Brown, late of Bristol Rovers, made some good runs on the right, and his partner, Davies, showed promising form. Oakley and Logan, on the left, made some good runs and got across some dange ous centres. They are a well balanced team, and when they get going require some stopping. The referee gave satisfaction.
