LUTON v. BRISTOL ROVERS.

ANOTHER UNLUCKY DEFEAT.

When the Luton Town and Bristol Rovers teams met in the Western city last November the Rovers secured a somewhat lucky triumph by a goal to nothing. History repeated itself on Saturday on the occasion of the Rovers' visit to Luton, the score, curiously enough, coming out at 1—0 in favour of the visitors. visitors. It ought not to be overlooked, in passing, that in the English Cup ties the Rovers defeated the Lutonians at Luton by 2-0. The weather was against thoroughly good football, a blustering wind prevailing and the pitch bearing perceptible traces of the recent heavy downfalls of rain. There was a moderate attendance of spectators.

Early in the game the Rovers sent right across the home goal, and then Barker failed to take advantage of a grand chance presented to him from the left-wing. A corner tell to the homesters, and, when Barker had shot over the bar, a similar advantage was enjoyed by Bristol. Some extremely neat passing was witnessed from the Rovers' forwards, and a free kick near the home goal looked dangerous; but the home forwards, for once in a way, show considerable dash, and Brown rushed away and forced a corner. Brown sent over the bar later on from a beautiful pass when he should have scored easily. The first point in the game fell to the Rovers, Williams beating Ord. There was some objection to the goal being allowed, it being considered by many of those present that the player had been off side, but an appeal to the referee was unavailing. Brown headed in well shortly afterwards, and Blessington with Brown headed in well shortly afterwards, and Blessington with a very fine shot led to a wonderful save by the Rovers' goalkeeper. He took no further part in the game.
