

MILLWALL. v. LUTON.

DEFEAT FOR THE VISITORS.

On Saturday the return Southern League match between the Millwall and Luton clubs was decided at Millwall, this being the last League game to be played on the East Ferry-road ground. Though the Lutonians had won comfortably at home on the previous Saturday, it was not expected that they would be able to repeat the performance, for they were deprived of the services of Lindsay, Tierney, Holdstock and Clifford. There was a very good attendance, the spectators including many from Luton.

The teams were:—

Millwall: Griffiths; Shutt and Davidson; Caie, Millar and Henderson; Dryburgh and Sharples, Carnelly, Banks and Wilson.

Luton: Ord; White and Street; Williams, Cox, and Hawkes; Durrant and Blessington, Barker, Plummer and Brown.

The home team started the game and were soon busy at the visitors' end. A foul against Luton presented the Millwallians with an opportunity which they were not slow to seize, Carnelly scoring from a capital centre by Wilson. More attacking by Millwall was witnessed, and it was not for some time that the Lutonians were enabled to advance, a good exhibition by the left wingers at length allowing of this. Before ends were changed Banks lowered Ord's colours and Brown scored for Luton, so that at half-time the positions were:

MILLWALL, 2; LUTON, 1.

In the second portion Millwall had the best of matters and scored another goal through the medium of Banks. The visitors made many gallant efforts to break away, though without the desired result, the home defence being far too strong for them. The eventual outcome was:
