LUTON AND THE SOUTHERN LEAGUE.

WIN AT BRENTFORD.

On Saturday the Luton team paid a visit to Brentford, this being the first League match on the Middlesex club's ground since their elevation to the first division of the Southern League. There was a crowd of some 4,000, and these were enabled to witness a very good game. McLeod and Robson were absent from the home side on the injured list, whereas the visitors were at full strength. The homesters won the toss and played down the incline with a slight breeze in their favour. The locals attacked early; but the efforts of the forwards were frustrated by Lindsay. The visitors retaliated and Blessington transferred neatly to Brown, only to see the centre forward shoot wide. Following the goal-kick the "blues" again gotaway and Spicer saved splendidly from Durrant. Midfield play ensued, the respective pairs of backs putting in some first-rate play. Give and take was the order until the midway stage was reached, when the positions were:

At the outset of the second half Luton went off at a great pace and indulged in an especially hot attack. Durrant and Blessington were prominent and gave the home custodian plenty of chances of distinguishing him-self.
