## BRENTFORD DEFEATED.

## TWO MORE LEAGUE POINTS.

Luton had an engagement with Brentford in the Southern League on Saturday and there were hopes that another couple of points would be secured at the expense of the home team. Nor on this occasion were the local supporters disappointed. There was a fair the local supporters disappointed.

The first half was rather evenly contested, both sides alternately attacking and providing the goal-keepers with something to do. Frail cleared well and keepers with something to do. This goal was really brilliantly obtained, and Allsopp is to be commended.

The point seemed to take a good deal of the energy out of the Brentford men. Still they persevered and occasionally made runs which were nipped in the bud by Lindsay or Williams, who were playing a good game. The Luton half-backs were in fine form, and continually frustrated the attempts of the home forwards. At half-time the score stood:

The second half had not been started long before it was apparent that the Brentford men had had enough of the sport. A penalty-kick was given against the home side, and from the kick Luton gained the lead. Brentford were not quite done with, though it was not very often that they got over the half-way line. Whenever they did the half-backs promptly pulled them back, or Lindsay or Williams cleared, so that the shots which Frail had to save were few and far between.

Davidson placed the matter beyond doubt by scoring the third goal. Bishop towards the end of the game had a lot of work to do, but he cleared well, and though Luton pressed considerably no further points were scored. It must be mentioned that Luton got the ball into the net no less than balf a dozen times. Blessington, in particular, shone and he and the new centre-forward were the best of the 10 forwards. Allsopp and Moody made a very capable left-wing, whilst Durrant did some smart things as Blessington's partner. Altogether Luton's forwards were much superior to Brentford. R. Hawkes played a fine game at half-back and White and F. Hawkes followed up very closely. They were always triers. The backs were very sound and Frail had more work than usual to do and did it well.

Although Southampton could only draw at Bristol, whereas Reading won at Watford, Southampton still hold a substantial lead in the tourney. Still, it is a good fight between the three top clubs for champion-ship honours, and any slip by one or the other will prove expensive. Portsmouth and Tottenham Hotspur both showed excellent form in their matches, but Millwall, in view of next Saturday's Cup tie, did not exert themselves at Wellingborough, and were well beaten. One game, that at Northampton, had to be postponed owing to torrents of rain. West Ham drew with Swindon.
