Durrant could not play for Luton, and New Brompton were without Clutterbuck, Raisbeck, and Boucher.

Choice of ends fell to Luton, and Stevenson kicked off for New Brompton.

Against a moderate breeze, the ball was started before three thousand spectators. The first movement was made on the home right by Bradhury, but his centre was easily cleared by R. Hawkes.

Luton very soon made a dash up together, and

from a fine pass by McKee, R. Hawkes, who had followed up well, scored for Luton. New Brompton replied with an attack on the left, which was ended by a clearance by McEwen,

and a run on the Luton left was spollt by Eaton getting off-side.

Then McKee was afterwards penalised for a foul on Goldie. The play went on well in favour of Luton, who were showing far better combination than their opponents.

Bennett afterwards had to kick out to stop Singleton, and the crowd howled accordingly. Goldie tried a long shot from half-back for New Brompton, and the ball just passed the upright.

Luton threatened on the right, and from a wellplaced corner by Eaton, F. Hawkes shot over the cross-bar.

Then the Luton goal was seriously jeopardised from a warm attack by the home forwards, and an appeal for a penalty kick was ignored by the referee.

Storey was again brought up for off-side on the Laton right wing.

Luton continued to have far more of the play than their opponents, and a beautiful bit of work done by Allsopp and Turner, ended in a well-directed shot, which was saved by Wetherell.

Then the home forwards got down on the right, and Thompson was nearly beaten by Robertson.

Soon after the second half was started, New

The visitors continued to show smarter form than their opponents, although the home backs displayed good defence, and kept the custodian free from work.

The play went in favour of New Brompton for a time, and the Luton goal had two narrow escapes from corners by Bradley, and then Luton replied.

Eaton scored a second goal, while New Brompton were appealing that the ball had gone outside.

Then New Brompton got going, and Stevenson and White equalised. The play became yery exciting from this point to the finish.
