## ANOTHER VICTORY.

This Southern League fixture was played on the Bury Park enclosure on Monday in the presence of about 3,500 spectators. Luton played the same team as on Saturday against Northants, and the visiting team was as follows:—

Kettering: Dorrington; Bosworth and Draper; Woods, Eccleston, and Grant; Webb,

Kettering won the toss, and Luton kicked towards the railway goal. The match opened at a good pace, but the turf was terribly soft, which made good football difficult. During the first ten minutes the visitors created a good impression, and managed to hold their own pretty well. Both goals were visited in turn, Webb forcing a corner off McEwen, and a splendid run by Durrant terminated in Bob Hawkes having a pop.

Luton now took up a determined attack, and Kettering had to show what defence they possessed. A pass from Fred Hawkes put Durrant in possession, and the ball was only got away with difficulty. Still vigorously attacking, White completely beat Dorrington, and drew first blood for Luton.

After this the game became more even again. Kettering played up well under this early reverse. Smith and Webb worried McEwen time after time, but the Luton captain was again in splendid form. Hartwell was also troublesome, and was certainly too much for Fred Hawkes.

Twice in succession the visitors had the hardest of luck in not getting through and finding the net. Durrant again breaking away, Luton attacked for fully ten minutes. Turner centred, and Dorrington made a marvellous save from a shot by Eaton.

At the other end, Webb centred, Leigh shot, but Thompson managed to keep out, though he did not succeed in getting the leather away. The next moment Hartwell had the ball safely placed in the net.

Luton afterwards forced several corners, and Allsopp once appeared to have a good opportunity, but his shot went very wide. Nothing further was scored, and half-time arrived with honours equally divided.
