Allsopp was the first to show up, and after a good run put in a splendid centre, which was spoiled by Eaton using his hands. Still Luton returned to the attack, Durrant sending across, and Turner testing Reilly, the home custodian, with a rare hot shot, which was neatly turned over the bar. S

Portsmouth, however, soon took up the aggressive, and Thompson was called upon to save from Wheldon. Later on he very cleverly frustrated Murray from converting a capital centre by Smith. The fact that the game had been in operation half an hour before Portsmouth notched their first point speaks well for Luton's defence. Burnett put through, giving Thompson no chance.

Luton failed to reduce the local's lead, and before the finish, Portsmouth scored from a free kick, White mulling the ball, which went through off his body.

On Monday Luton were at Wellingborough, and once more met with defeat. The Northants lads are by no means a snip, and are not always consistent. Luton were minus Bob Hawkes and Durrant, and the locals were without Howard. The match was very tame, little interest being manifested in the encounter. Thompson was twice beaten in the first half, first by McDonald and then by Dartnell. The Luton forwards were at times very disappointing.
