This match was played on the Bury Park enclosure on Saturday, before a rather poor gate of some 3,000 or 4,000 spectators. The result was satisfactory, and the match was by no means an uninteresting one. The directors have made many shifts and changes, but with Saturday's combination they grouped the players better than might have been expected. Mr. Spencer was dropped in favour of Lamberton, who did much better than the amateur berton, who did much better than the amateur. Bob Hawkes was also placed in the 'ront line, playing inside right to Eaton, while Moody took the place of Ross, the latter being confined to his bed. I have always maintained that Bob Hawkes plays far better as a forward; with him in that line we are more likely to get goals, because generally the Luton forwards are too anxious to shoot. Lamberton made a very decent centre, and as a result of having a plucky forward line, Luton showed some of its old form.

Our encounters with New Brompton have generally been close things. Last year at Luton we just managed to win by an odd goal (1-0), and away we made a draw of 2 goals each.

On the present occasion the visitors were without Barnfather, Turner, and Lloyd, so they could not be considered as being at top strength.

Play opened very fast, and the visitors set the ball rolling with a strong wind behind them. It was plainly to be seen that Luton was in fine fettle, and they were not long in taking up the attack. Barnes sent in a couple of good centres, but the leather went behind each time. Though the wind was against them, Luton were attacking desperately. Moody was twice dangerous, Walton saving a certain goal by holding our inside-left. Shortly afterwards Lamberton shot clean into the net, but at the same moment the whistle went for a foul. This was extremely hard lines for Luton, but Referee Pitts decided that the point must be disallowed.

Eventually the visitors managed to get away but nothing came of their efforts, Lindsay clearing rather easily. Numerous corners fell to the home team, but the wind made accurate shooting difficult. The first half was a blank score.

Upon resuming, the visitors played up well,

though they were scarcely ever dangerous. There could be no doubt that Luton were having the best of matters. Moody, from a centre by Eaton, just headed by the upright. At the other end, Morris nearly found the net, but eventually the home defence beat back the attack, a foul on Lamberton enabling Luton to get round the farm goal. The game was most prolific of corners, but Griffiths exercised conspicuous judgment. Once Bob Hawkes
