The early morning opened out brightly, but, unfortunately King Sol was unable to get the upper hand of Jupiter Pluvius, and the result was that heavy rain was followed by a dull, drizzling rainy afternoon.

The elements were all against a good gate, and this was most disappointing to the directors, for there is no denying the fact that they require good gates to keep the ball rolling.

Like Luton, Brentford is a team that has not realised expectations in the Southern League, for at the commencement of the season both teams expected to make a good show in the League. Brentford have certainly done better than Luton, but their record is not one to be very proud of.

There was a marked difference in the height and weight of the two teams; Luton are somewhat on the small side, whilst Brentford are recognised as the heaviest team in the Southern League. Luton are smart and ningo, but in heavy work the visitors have a decided advanfage, and on a heavy ground this often proves ver useful.
