The ground was in a splendid condition and a good gate was recorded. There was very little wind.

The 'Spurs won the toss and Luton kicked

Two corners proved fruitless for the 'Spurs. Half-time: -'SPURS ... 1 LUTON ... 0 Luton were forced on the defensive at the start notwithstanding that the 'Spurs were without Chapman. Still Luton nearly got through twice by Barnes and Moody, and then the 'Spurs had one more chance. After this Luton played up remarkably well, and Eggett was given six shots to save to every one sent to Lindsay. Two or three times he only got to the ball by the merest chance, all of the Luton forwards putting in hot shots. Ross, in particular, was in good form, and once gave Eggett a terrific gallop from one end of the goal to the other, only to see the ball just go wide of the post a yard ahead of him.
