WATFORD v. LUTON

Watford beat Luton on Good Friday in the Southern League at Watford by 3 goals to nil. The truth is Luton were completely routed, despite the fact that the home side had one or two of their best men away. Describing the match a contemporary says: "The issue was put beyond all doubt in the first half-hour, during which the home forwards swept the Luton defence off their legs. After Lindsay had saved in great style from Turner and Eames, Tennant opened the score, and M'Cartney got a second from a penalty. Not long afterwards Goodall scored a characteristic goal, and thus Watford had the substantial lead of 3 to nil. On crossing over the second half was poor compared with the first, owing in a great measure to three of the home van being injured. On the other side, Barnes went lame. Luton improved during the closing stages, but the shooting was nothing great, and Biggar saved everything that was on the mark. Playing with only two sound men in front, Watford had quite an equal share of the game, but the second half was drawn blank. The home defence found it a comparatively easy task to bundle the light Luton attack off the ball, and it must be said that the visiting forwards were a very poor lot. The losers were as usual well served at half, while M'Ewen was great at back. For the winners Jack Cether was a very good substitute for Lindsay. Badenoch and Brookes were always on the premises, and Goodall had no superior."
