Platt sa ed finely a header from Weston, and at the other end the visitors' goalkeeper was lucky in keeping Luton out. So far there was little in the game, Luton, if anything, having the advantage. The locals worked their way up, but Slater headed over a centre by Barnes. Needham made a dashing run down and centred to Roberts, who was in a good position, but Luton fortunately had their goal packed, and the visitors were kept out. A centre by Barnes at the other end was just saved by Hewitson in time. Once more Slater headed just over the bar, and a free enabled the Glaziers to take up the attack, but their effort was weak. Luton were now on the aggressive, and twice the visitors' citadel all but fell to Barnes and then to Pickering. Slater finished the attack by heading behind. Wills was forced to concede a corner to Pickering. At the other end Platt nearly made a "mess," being lucky in clearing after he had fumbled with the ball. But later he made two nice saves from Harker and from Needham. Then an unusual thing happened. Platt kicked off the goal line right to the other end of the field. The Palace were now attacking with spirit, but fortunately the homesters succeeded in keeping them out, and at half-time there was no score.

Resuming with ten men, Luton were soon after goals, and a foul taken by Jackson all but scored. Then the visitors had a look in. At the other end Luton experienced another piece of hard luck. Then Platt saved a tast drive from Weston. Harker had a pop, and Platt saved at the expense of a corner, which was beautifully placed, the custodian just fisting out as the ball came sailing under the bar. Changing the venue, Pickering put in a wretched shot. The visitors were not to be shaken off, however, and a moment later they scored through Roberts. McCurdy had made a faulty kick, but he saved the second time.

Towards the close there was only one team in it, and many were surprised that in the bad light the Palace did not increase their lead. Once more Luton missed several chances, and the Palace were easy winners. However, the absence of McDonald in the second moiety told a great deal against Luton, for had the full team been on the field, it is just possible a different complexion would have been given to the game.
