Platt saved a magnificent shot from Wilson and for some minutes there was every evidence that the fact that they were two goals behind had had a good effect upon Portsmouth who showed themselves in better light than they had previous y done. Kirby only just missed the post with a nice header on one occasion and on another Dimmock had to bring him to a standstill.

Pompey continued to fight hard to get on more even terms and it was only Luton's sterling defence which held for them the lead already obtained. For the first time during the match play began to get really interesting but unfortunately the light was also getting bad. A few minutes before the finish Rankin retired and the homesters were left with only ten men but they had little difficulty in holding their own and the Town ran out victorious by 2-0.
