The wretched weather spoiled a good match as well as a good gate on Saturday. The Luton directors were anxiously looking forward to a big attendance on the occasion of Northampton's visit to Strawopolis. However, though the "Cobblers" brought 500 supporters with them, the "gate" did not comprise more than 3,000.
