Fully six thousand spectators assembled, and it may be said at once that they had very good value for their money, although deprived the satisfaction of seeing a victory for Luton. The home team suffered defeat, but the case was very different from that of a fortnight previously, when they lost to Norwich as a result of rank bad play. On Saturday, they really performed very creditably, and were unlucky to lose.

In the first half Luton were elightly the superior team, although two or three of the p. ayers suffered badly from the very vigorous tactics of their opponents. They also began the second half extremely well, and when Brown was robbed of a certain goal by Bulcock's illegitimate effoct, it only needed the conversion of the penalty to give Luton the additional spirithly well all the afternoon.
