## BOB HAWKES OPENS WITH TWO LOYELY GOALS AT MARDY.

Luton were fortunate in one respect at least in opening their new Welsh campaign, in that they were able to turn out their full strength at Mardy on Saturday. This was something to he thankful for, because what sort of a team would have been sent if two or three players had been seriously injured during the opening week is more than one dares to employ the imagination upon. Potts, who had a rest against Bedford, was able to resume, but Trainer Lawson was just a wee bit doubtful about Bob Hawkes, whose thigh was none too sound. As a matter of fact it did give way during the match at Mardy, and Bob will certainly have to stand down on Wednesday against Southampton, but with attention from "Billy" he expects to captain the team when Mardy pay their return visit on Saturday.

Luton left by the 4.15 p.m. train to St. Pancras on Friday, and joined the South Wales express at Paddington, reaching Cardiff at 9.15 p.m. By the way, Cardiff is the "hub" of South Wales "Soccer" now, and while in that city you do not realise what Second Division means. The City Club is run on English lines, and most of the players are more or less known, and the usual comradeship between football professionals off the field is kept up. Every week-end two or three League teams make Cardiff their headquarters, and therefore players and officials fraternise together. For instance, Exeter City joined the train at Newport and travelled with the Luton players to Cardiff on their way to Merthyr. They, like Luton, stayed the night in Cardiff, resuming their journey after lunch os Saturday. Although in the big towns in South Wales the regulation time of kick-off is adhered to, the "Valley Clubs" have different ideas, and want to start much later. This is on account of the eight-hour system of working the mines, which means that the last shift do not get up from the pit until three or four o'clock. On Saturday a start was not made until five o'clock, but the light was not at all bad when the game finished at a quarter to seven.

Mardy does not, perhaps, convey much danger to Lutonians, but on arrival at Cardiff the players were early warned against over-confidence. Indeed the boot was on the other leg altogether, for the Cardiff Press were unanimous in expressing the view that although Southend and Croydon both had a chance at Aberdare and Llainelly respectively, Luton was not at all likely to get even one point at Mardy. One paper went so far as to state that Luton themselves could not expect to have a chance at all, while another blunbly said that if they obtained one point they would have to earn it, with the evident expectation that such a result was altogether out of the question. The feeling in Cardiff was that Luton were faced with by far the hardest task on Saturday, so far as the three English clubs were concerned. It is not so much the playing strength of the Mardy club as the altogether different conditions of the ground and surroundings which make this fixture so difficult, but more of this feature will be gathered from subsequent notes.

Day punched it away for the moment, but Hopwood met the return and opened the score for his side amid tremendous excitement. Worth then managed to get away and promised to finish up with an opening, but he got a shade too much power behind his toe and it only resulted in a goal kick.

Twenty minutes off time Hopwood got a drive home with a crowd of players between himself and the goal. Day simply did not see the ball, and made no effort whatever, although it is quite doubtful if he would have been able to stop the shot even with a clear view, it sailing in low at a great pace. It was now a great fight to the finish, Luton being mainly on the defensive, and although at times they were hard pressed they managed to keep their opponents out. Indeed, the easiest looking chance fell to Stephenson at the top end of the field, but after getting right through he twisted his ankle, and the game was stopped for several minutes while Lawson attended to the injury. He did not come off the field and finished the game, although he limped badly and was of little use. Result: Luton 3, Mardy 2.

## COMMENT ON THE PLAY AND PLAYERS.

The first impression made by the visit to Mardy is that it is no walk-over to earn promotion. If Mardy are an average side points will be very difficult to obtain in Wales, whatever those clubs may do away from home. The crowd on the whole were a sporting lot, although Potts was a target for some abuse for being too deliberate in taking goal kicks. The general opinion in Wales is that Mardy is one of the three grounds which help the home side to a greater extent than should be possible, and therefore Luton must consider themselves fortunate in getting off with both points. points.

Day once or twice punched the ball away when it seemed safer to catch it, but in the closing stages he did finely. The backs kept up their end in fine style, except that Potts was rather upset by the spectators for a time. He eventually got over this, and was playing for safety with fine judgment at the finish. Undoubtedly Luton's strongest line at Mardy was at half-back, All three men played a great game, with Bob Hawkes the outstanding player on the field. Forward work was greatly handicapped by the small ground. Still Stephenson and Worth managed to show to advantage, the inside trio being a bit overcrowded by the continual nearness of the opposing defenders. posing defenders.

Mardy have several good players on Saturday's form. Coates, at centre-forward, would not disgrace a first-class side, and the fact that he is selected for Wales on Wednesday next at Cardiff, shows that his fame is pretty well known in that locality. Jones, the right full back, is also playing in the same match, and is a clever player, and in the first half when faced by the wind played a fine game. It will be as well to see Mardy on an average ground before expressing a definite opinion as to their capabilities, and as they visit Luton on Saturday it will be a good opportunity for taking a line as to the probability of Luton getting to the top of the League.
