Treharris were only credited with six points for seven matches played, but they are not by any means easy of conquest (especially on their own small ground), and they have improved wonderfully since their visit to Luton a few weeks ago, when they were trounced by four goals to nil. Pretty play by the home vanguard resulted in Archie Pickett skimming the cross-bar with a rasping shot. Wileman again got clean through, and Streeton, meeting the ball as it came across, drove it into the net giving Demmery no chance. Following this reverse, the Luton defence was again severely tested, but could not be beaten, as they packed the goal when danger threatened. A little later the Treharris right wing got going and Hugh Williams made unsuccessful attempts at scoring, with the result that the teams crossed with Luton leading by 1.0.

Luton began forcing matters after the interval, and were using their weight to advantage. They continued pressing, and increased the lead through R. Hawkes, but Demmery could not be blamed. Play continued to favour the Straw-plaiters, and Wileman was again conspicuous with a fine run on the right, and in a final efforthe ball skimmed the cross-bar.
