The Luton inside left got the ball from Roberts, who tricked Milton easily, and planted the ball perfectly for Robinson to score, Five minutes later another clever bit of work on the part of Roberts led up to the ball being

placed nicely in the goal mouth, Simms and Rellinson both being well placed, but each just failed to gather as it passed across the field. Hoar however dashed in, and meeting the ball drove it right across into the far corner with an unatoppable shot. Nothing further happened up to half-time, and Luton then crossed over with a well-deserved lead.
