

LUTON TOWN'S BIG WIN.

Most of Luton Town players have gone to their homes this week, and they left the supporters in good humour by reason of the clever display against Norwich in the last game of the season. There was no suggestion in the early play that this was the last game, for pace, vigour, and general keenness were fully maintained for two-thirds of the game.

There was no question as to the better team. From the opening stages the Town were quicker on the ball, more skilful in manipulation, had better understanding and speed, and finished their movements with a snap. O'Hagan kept goal brilliantly, but was fortunate to be only twice beaten before the interval. BUTCHER got the first after a scramble in the goal-mouth, consequent upon Bonsall putting in a nice flag-kick. Two minutes later BONSALL won applause by a very fine effort. He struck the bar with a shot, and a tussle ensued, from which he was able to head into the net.

The goals in the second half came very soon after the resumption, and Butcher was the founder of each. He made a clever run and enabled Hoar to centre, and after the ball had struck a defender, HOTEN headed into the net. This was within three minutes of the restart, and four minutes later Butcher made a golden opening for HOAR to career through and wind up with a terrific shot that O'Hagan hardly saw.

The Town were content with their score, and troubled very little after this, so that the Norwich forwards had chances, but failed to make good use of them.

For the Town Gibbon had few anxious moments. Graham, who had to be taken off with a wrenched shoulder late in the game, played finely in conjunction with Tirrell, but they had a soft time owing to the mastery of the home halves, who quite subdued the visiting forwards. Walker put up a very useful game at centre-half, Foster was a very powerful agent, and Roe was at his very best, his work being very attractive. They kept their forwards working, too, and the vanguard have never shown such superiority, with the exception perhaps of the game with Exeter City. Still they could have scored as many goals as on that occasion had they put themselves about very much. Every man did well, and Butcher was exceptionally clever, and he shot as well as any member of the line. Reid was unfortunate to be the only forward without a goal. He had his chance from a penalty, but hit the bar with a hard shot. He got the ball into the net once with a powerful drive, but was given offside. Hoten and Hoar made several fine efforts, and Bonsall showed that with experience he will make good.

O'Hagan kept goal grandly for the visitors, some of his saves in the first half being very fine indeed. Hope was the better back, the veteran Martin a useful half, and Dennison and Booth did well forward. They were well beaten, however, as they readily admitted, in a game that was much cleaner than the average.
