At Luton the City's methods evoked severe criticism, but at Norwich their robust and often unscrupulous tactics were accentuated, and they gave the Town a very rough time. Fouls were frequent, and with the crowd showing anything but a sporting spirit, the game developed until it was distinctly unpleasant. Several players were cautioned.

Austin scored after fifteen minutes' play, and Jackson headed the second goal from Austin's centre right on time, the game not being resumed after this.

The brightest feature of the match was the wonderful game played by Anderson at right back, his working being a revelation of all-round skill. Gibbon had no chance with the goals registered against him, and Graham also played a strong game. The middle line was not so good as usual, and the forwards had to fend for themselves. In the first half they did very well, but in the second they did not get many chances. Hoten nearly equalised on one occasion, and his play all through was better than in many recent games.

Norwich merited their success on the run of the game, but their methods were deserving of failure rather than victory.
