There was little to enthuse about in this game, says our Bristol correspondent, for although the teams started well, the heat and the effects of the two previous hard games in which the players had been engaged, speedily reduced their pace and energy, and long before the end the spectators were wishing for it. The Town were the more dangerous in the opening stages, and after fifteen minutes a smart movement by the right wing resulted in Kerr getting a chance from Butcher's pass, and he sent the ball into the net just wide of the reach of Whatley, who came out. There was no further score until seven minutes from the end, when Woodhall equalised for the Rovers, who were a man short all through the second half, Lofthouse having been injured in a collision with Walker.

The palm was given to Anderson for another wonderful exhibition, and he was declared to be the outstanding player of the two teams. Graham was a sound assistant, and Orr did well as Gibbon's deputy, the latter having to stand down owing to an injured foot. The halves played well, and in comparison with the Rovers, the forwards were the better, although there was not a lot of clever combination.

As at Luton, the Rovers were best served by Wragge and Phillips.
