

LUTON'S FIRST LEAGUE POINTS.

Success in Opening Home Game.

FOUR GOALS AGAINST BOURNEMOUTH LAST NIGHT.

The score in last night's game just about measured the superiority of Luton Town on the run of the whole game. He would have been a daring soul that would have predicted such an ample margin, but the visitors flattered but to deceive. For half-an-hour they were slightly the better side, but at the end of an hour the Town were just about on top, and then in the third stage there was no question as to which had lasted the game better, and, bar accidents, which side deserved the points at stake.

It was a great start, for inside three minutes each goal had fallen, and hundreds of spectators arrived too late to see this unusual opening. The late comers found the crowd in

A FERMENT,

and the simmering had barely commenced when the Town's lead renewed the enthusiasm. Then for an hour the balance of play fluctuated, with the Town always having their territorial advantage, though unable to add to their score, but two more goals were booked before the end, and everybody but the Bournemouth contingent went home satisfied.

It was more evident than ever that the new rule has quickened play, but at some sacrifice of skill. The side that got in most long passes was the more dangerous, and the Town players were longer in discovering this than were the visitors. Even then they did not make the most of it, or there would have been

A BIGGER FEAST

of goals.

The inclusion of Graham and Shankly vice Till and Thomson was a paying policy judging by results, for both were as good as any two players in the game. The latter had the joy of scoring the first goal. Miller had made tracks on the right wing, and was fouled by Collin or Leitch on the goal-line at the edge of the penalty area. Shankly was practically unmarked when Miller took the kick and fitted it beautifully to SHANKLY'S boot, and Wilson had no chance to prevent a goal. This was a good start, but the visitors had ideas, too, and after the first little scrum at the kick-off, Smith made ground splendidly, and then pushed the ball through the middle to EYRE, who went a pace or two and then shot between the backs wide of Mingay's left hand, and the ball was in the net, with

THE SCORES EQUAL.

The only offside decision of the game came immediately afterwards, and Eyre was pulled up. Play was very fast, and always entertaining, the ball being too much in the air, perhaps, and boot too strongly applied as a rule. The visitors were doing well, but they got a severe shock when Reid chased and robbed Roberts, and then shot the ball forward to THOMPSON. The latter took a stride or two and then shot with terrific power from about 25 yards range, and Wilson was beaten to the wide wide world. The play of Shankly was a feature of the game, and after good work with Miller, he and Reid only just failed to score, while Thompson was also very close, the ball trickling past the upright with the goalkeeper beaten. Clever combination between Miller and Walker enabled Reid to head in, but Wilson's long arms managed to tip the ball over the bar. Several corner kicks were not improved upon, but once there was

A WILD SCENE

in the visitors' goal-mouth, several players going down in an attempt to force the ball through or away from goal. Clifford and Maidment made a few raids, and Eyre and Roberts were always dangerous when they got away, but Anderson and Graham covered well, and save for one failure of the former to get the ball away by dribbling, and a subsequent fine save by Mingay, the Town defence had not much to trouble about.

The players did not leave the field at the

interval, and as soon as the game was restarted the Town put up a warm attack, but were beaten back. Dennis had Wilson beaten with a fine shot lobbed right across goal, the ball hitting the post and coming out for Wilson to scramble it away. The pressure increased, and corners were forced by both flanks. Jennings once headed against the bar from a flag kick, and Dennis

with a kick from the flag. Reid had hard luck, one hot drive cannoning from an opponent, and another creeping past the upright. Then the visitors' defence got into a tangle, and Reid and Thompson were right past the backs. Wilson came out, and as Reid drove the ball for goal, the custodian again effected a magnificent save, thanks to his tremendous reach. Clifford sent up the visitors' hopes with two fine runs and centres, and Maidment should have scored from one of these. Mingay brought off a good save, and then, with a quarter-of-an-hour to go, the Town's lead was increased. Saxton had come well up the field, and got knocked over, and the ball went to THOMPSON, who was well on the Bournemouth goal side of the fallen player. The referee allowed him to go on, and getting the ball nicely into position, he fired in another great shot from twenty yards range, and Wilson was

BEATEN ALL THE WAY.

Saxton had to be helped off the field, and the visitors grumbled a little, but he would have been powerless to stop Thompson, and the referee was reading the rules correctly. Jennings got his eyebrow laid open in a scrimmage, but remained on the field. The visitors tried hard in spasms, for they appeared to be almost played out, but Mingay effected a great save from Eyre. The Town were quite the better side now, and REID and Thompson had the goal at their mercy just before the end, and the former scored comfortably. Other chances there were, but Wilson was in good form, and he saved his side several times when goals appeared certain.

THE PLAYERS.

Mingay's display left nothing to be desired, and he brought off two or three capital saves. Anderson, except for the one occasion when he indulged his dribbling propensity unsuccessfully, was at his best, and Graham pleased everybody by his direct and sure methods. There was no better back on the field, and he, at least, seems to have assimilated the value of returning the ball quickly to his forwards. He not only kicked soundly, but he tackled with judgment, and he showed good pace. The halves were of like quality, and were too good for the visitors after half-an-hour's play. All three played valiantly, though Miller was probably the best in attack. Shankly was the favourite of the crowd, for he was always working, and he displayed sagacity beyond his years. The only fault that could be found with his work was a tendency to get too close to Miller and give him the ball when he was covered instead of swinging it across goal. It would be churlish to quibble about this, however, so well did the young Scot play. Reid, too,

PROVED HIS TITLE

to the inside-left position, and his strength and go-aheadness whatever the danger unsettled the visitors' backs. The wingers did much good work, but Miller is not used enough considering his speed. Thompson knows little about embroidery. He believes on the pay-by-results principle, and with a little more celerity in getting off the mark, a player with such a shot in his boots is going to do a lot of havoc with goal averages. It is not the fashion nowadays to shoot from twenty yards, but Thompson is not in the fashion, and I don't suppose he cares how far the range if he can only get the ball true to his foot.

Captain Prince Cox refereed splendidly, and while he did not stop for the appeals of the namby-pambies, he was pretty smart in stopping foul play, of which there was much less than we have been accustomed to seeing in games so hotly contested as this.

For the visitors Wilson kept goal grandly. Saxton was the safer back. Butt the best of a hard-working trio, and Clifford and Eyre the pick of the attack.

There were upwards of 8,000 spectators.

Few people, I venture to think, realise to the full extent the difference the new offside rule is to make in football. It is going to revolutionise the game. "Football" is now a young man's game. "Football" was the expression used by an old player on Monday night, and I am sure that everybody who saw the game on the Town ground will agree that this is a neat description. There will be much less of artistry and pattern weaving; every forward will have to be in a hurry, and backs and half-backs even more so, for the team that can carve the quickest and shortest route to goal will be most successful, always provided that team is able to stay, for stamina will play a big part in results.

Luton Town have made

A MODERATE OPENING

if the strength of the opposition is to be judged upon last season's positions, and on Saturday night there were many supporters inclined to despondency because defeat had been the portion at Merthyr. No account was taken of the possibilities of Merthyr having improved their team, and in view of the fact that the guests for Monday had opened with a fine win over Swindon, there were gloomy faces among the crowd when the teams turned out. Needless to say, the result effectually allayed fear of a worse season than last, although none would care to tip the Town as a promotion side on this one display.

At Merthyr the team began well, and our Welsh correspondent says that there was

NOT A GOAL DIFFERENCE

between the sides. Had Luton maintained the dash with which they opened the game they would have won, but they appeared to lose heart to some extent when the home team had equalised REID'S goal, which came after 15 minutes' play. RUMNEY was the man to head the equaliser just before the interval, and CRUICKSHANK got the winning goal for Merthyr a few minutes before the end, after Mingay had made a fine save, but was unable to get the ball far away.

"Luton's play was disappointing after the early stages," he continues. Mingay was not to blame in any way for the defeat, but the backs, after starting with confidence, allowed the speedy Merthyr forwards to overrun them, and with the inside men of the attack

SHOWING MORE METTLE

than we have been accustomed to at Merthyr for a long time, it was quite on the cards that the spoils would remain in the Welsh town. The Luton halves were strong, but Jennings' robust methods, once so much to the liking of the local crowd, did not please them now. However, he played a courageous game all the time, and without nursing his men so well as Millar, he certainly gave the wing men the long passes that are going to be useful under the new rule regarding offside. Walker was a good check, and he gave Abrahams very little room to work, but Arblaster was often too smart for him.

The Luton

FORWARDS WERE STREAKY.

Miller was exceedingly fast, but he did not receive the attention and help he required. N. Thomson was slow and hesitating, and this affected both his partner and the leader, J. Thompson. The latter made several strong individual efforts lying well up the field, and but for the vigilance of Ferrans he might have won the game for Luton. Reid played very well, and he showed Merthyr that they had lost a good player through not watching local talent. He was the best of the inside forwards for Luton. Dennis did a few good things, but he missed one or two chances.

For Merthyr Brookes made a few good saves, but he did not inspire confidence. Ferrans was the better back, and the halves were a lot of tryers, with Woodward as good as any half-back on the field. In the forward line Cruickshank played splendidly, and Arblaster was the cleverest of the inside men.

AT LUTON.

When the above report arrived on Monday morning it came as no surprise that two changes were made in the eleven to represent Luton against Bournemouth on Monday night. There were 8,000 spectators present before the game had been long in progress, and if every man has spoken his mind about the game then there should be well over 12,000 present when Newport line up on Saturday.

The visitors were very confident when they stepped on to the field, but within a minute they had received a big shock, for a free kick was given against one of their defenders for a foul on Miller, while trying to force the Town winger over the goal-line just on the edge of the penalty area. When the players positioned for the free-kick, Miller noted SHANKLY unmarked in direct line, and he quickly pushed the ball in line to the Scot, who crashed it

INTO THE NET FIRST TIME.

and thus gave Luton the lead. There was a tremendous yell from the crowd, but the echoes had not died away before there was another fierce cry, with a note of alarm in it, for the visitors went straight down, thanks to clever work by Smith, and EYRE notched the equaliser with a quick ground shot that was well away from the reach of Mingay. In the following play the visitors showed more speed and better method than the Town, and there were many who would have tipped them to win, for they worked up many attacks that threatened goals, and the Town halves were not able to hold the opposing forwards at all well. Gradually, however, the home forwards began to take a stronger hand in the game, and the inside men did

A LOT OF FORAGING.

It was this assistance to the half-backs that enabled the Town to get the lead, for Reid chased Roberts and took the ball from him, making some ground before pushing it through the middle to THOMPSON, who was clear of opposition. As Saxton closed upon him the Town centre-forward shot from over 25 yards' range, a great drive, and the ball flew into the net wide of the desperate Wilson. It was a spectacular goal, and pleased the crowd immensely. Even then the visitors held their own in the general play, but the Town were doing better, and before the interval they were slightly the better side.

In the second half the visitors' goal underwent a hot pressure, and had many narrow escapes, while Wilson made half-a-dozen saves when he might have been excused failure. Occasionally there was a raid on the home goal, but for the greater part of the time the ball was

IN THE DANGER ZONE

for Bournemouth, and the bar and post were struck by shots, while two or three easy chances were missed. Half-an-hour of this half had elapsed when the Town increased their lead. Saxton had run up the field and was tackled successfully. He went down as the ball went out to THOMPSON, who got away at once. He cleared all opposition, and then shot suddenly with all his might at a range of 25 yards, and Wilson was hopelessly beaten by the speed of the ball. Saxton had to leave the field, his ankle being injured, and in his absence Luton had very much more of the play, but did not seem to trouble a lot about goal average. Just before the end, however, Thompson and Reid had the benefit of some clever work by Millar, and either of them might have scored. REID took charge, and stalling off Collin he shot into the net out of Wilson's reach.

It was

A SPIRITED GAME

for an hour, but at the end of that time the visitors seemed to have expended all their energy, and the Town were playing as fast as ever. The home team won because of their superior fitness as much as anything else. Mingay comforted those who have had fears about his daring. The goalkeeper is going to play a much more important part in days to come than hitherto, and I fancy that Mingay will be one of those who will shine. One marvelous save he made late in the second half when Eyre appeared a certain scorer, but generally he had far less to do than Wilson. Anderson did well, but Graham was probably the best back on the field, and in view of the work all four backs were required to do, this is no disparagement of the others. Graham

SHOULD RETAIN HIS PLACE

while he plays as well as he did on this occasion. The halves were not good in the first half, and Jennings appeared unable to do anything right for half-an-hour. Fortunately, he improved, and was more like his best in the second. Walker, too, was a bit slow at the start, but his best came after the interval, and he had much to do with the success of Shankly. Millar has not reached the standard of the end of last season, but he was the pick of the line. Of the forwards, Shankly was the most prominent, and, like Graham, on this form he is a certainty for the premier team. He has not yet learned how to get the best out of Miller, but that will come with association. All that is necessary is to give the winger

PLENTY OF ROOM.

and plenty of work, and I am sure the effect will be reflected in the goal average. As usual, there were uncouth spectators who began hectoring the winger, but they did not know he was suffering an injury which may keep him out of the side next Saturday. Miller must have room to operate and then he will succeed. Reid and Dennis came near to something like their best as a wing, and the former was as forceful in attack as ever. Thompson's shooting is good enough for anything, and when he can get off the mark a little quicker he will be a prize specimen.

The visitors owed a good deal to Wilson and Saxton, while Butt was probably the pick of their whole side. They have a smart little winger in Clifford, and a centre-forward of great promise in Eyre, but the others appeared to weaken a great deal before the interval.

The Town Reserves opened with a win at the expense of Coventry City Reserves, but they had a very hard task to get both points, for the visitors played a strong game, and for long periods were quite the equal of Luton. The only goal of the first half was scored by SHANKLY, but MCGREGOR equalised from a free kick early in the second half, and after Findlay had saved a penalty kick taken by Graham, ROGERS got the winning goal with a shot that went in off a defender.

It was a very good game, and if the teams engaged in Southern League football play as well as this all through the season, there should be big gates and a lot of encouragement for the Town Reserves.

Purdy kept goal splendidly, and he had a lot to do. Graham was in good form at back, and Struthers showed up better than he did in the practice games.

RICHARDS' FIRST GAME

had been anticipated with a good deal of interest, and he showed a lot of skill, both in interception and feeding of his forwards, while his huge frame came to the rescue of the defence many times. He does not yet appear to be quite fast enough, but that may be accounted for by the fact that he is still suffering leg injury sustained in training, and he felt it on Saturday. Bedford and Neal were hefty workers, the former doing a lot of excellent defensive work, and the latter was as tireless and strong as ever. Moffat and Shankly were the best wing in the game, doing many clever things, but Littlewood did not get going as well as we would have liked. Rogers played nicely at inside left, but Robinson was good only in parts.

SPORTS CHAT.

ROGERS.

Luton Town have to pay £50 for the privilege of putting Bert Rogers on the professional list. That is the decision of The League, and in the opinion of most of us it is an unjust decision, and the club responsible, West Ham United, might have shown a little more charity to a struggling club. Luton Town gave Rogers a place in the Southern League team last season, and on the strength of his performances put him on the retained list of that League. Meanwhile, West Ham United hear good reports of him, send down a man and get Rogers to sign a League form and promise him a place in a trial game. Luton, requiring players at the beginning of the season, find that Rogers wishes to be a professional, and as he does well in a practice game, they make him a professional. West Ham report Luton to the League, and the latter's management committee, on which Luton have no voice, ordered Luton to pay £25 as a transfer fee and £25 fine. They find "extenuating circumstances," which is another way of saying that West Ham tried to poach Luton's preserves, but found the game locked up. West Ham "did not want the money," so gave the transfer fee to the League Benevolent Fund. And there you are.

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It would be interesting to know what could have happened had Rogers signed for Kettering or Peterborough, who have no connection with the League, and if it would not have been illegal for one of those clubs to engage him, why should it be illegal for Luton? I do not know what the Town directors think of it, but I am certain that the followers of the Town will wish for nothing better than that West Ham United should have to come to Luton in the Football Cup Competition—and get beaten.
