## Directors Get Busy.

I UTON TOWN opened the new, season disastrously, for they failed at Southend on Saturday, and on Monday evening at home they lost to Norwich City by three goals to one. In each match, misfortune befell the Town, but on Monday night they were well beaten.

## AT SOUTHEND.

It was Luton's galling experience on Saturday to score an apparently good goal and see it disallowed, and this at a crucial stage of the game, when defences are taut and keen to hold what they have. Then the cup of bitterness was filled to the brim, for Southend were able to get away in spite of an appeal for offside, and to score the only goal of the match. The two outstanding points of discussion after the game among the players, were the position of Woods, who netted for the Town, and Horne, who opened the movement that led to the one goal. Concensus of opinion was that the Town should have had a point, and that would have been generous to Southend.

It was a disappointing game apart from It was a disappointing game apart from the result, but I can t know that the players can be blamed for that. The going was good, for the sunny weather had quickly dried the ground, and then there was a strong wind, and it carried the light ball anywhere but where the players wanted to put it.

There was very little to choose between the teams, and on the run of the play, Southend certainly had no superiority. If they were a bit nippier forward, they were not so secure in defence. Play fluctuated, first one side and then the other attack-ing, but thrills were few and far between. Now and then there was a burst of appreciation over individual cleverness, such hot tussies as were seen in the vicinity of goal were at Southend's goal. That must have been pleasing to Luton's supporters, for hitherto there has been a tendency to cramp the goalkeeper, often with fatal results, but in this game Abbott had plenty of room, and was able to show up to advantage. In the matter of shooting, there was very little in it, neither team getting in many shots, so keen was the tackling of the defenders. In this first half the chief danger to the

Town was from the right winger and the inside left, and at the other end the Town

left wing usually led the way.

Abbott made one good save, but had nothing else to do of much consequence, and Boyce had not a lot of calls, though once was in extreme difficulty in dealing with a centre from Pointon.

In the second half, with the wind at their backs, the Town soon made the pace. They put some hone into their work, and the home supporters had many anxious moments. The left wing was most moments.
