LUTON WIN AGAIN.

BRIGHTON'S PROMOTION HOPES FINALLY CRUSHED.

THOUGH there is no prospect of Luton Town finishing as high up in the League competition as last season, their improvement this year has been such as to deserve better support than has been accorded in the last three or four games. and there were only 6,000 spectators to see them tackle and beat Brighton and Hove Albion, a team that could be regarded as among the possible champions before the game on Saturday.

Perhaps the football served up did not merit a larger attendance; but the conditions were all against attractive football, and the Town certainly showed more speed and skill than their exalted opponents. On the whole it was a good win, and should have been more convincing from the aspect of result, as the Town missed several good chances and had more ill-luck in their more frequent attacks.

The only goal was scored by YARDLEY, twenty minutes after the start, and was a splendid goal, chiefly due to a fine bit of opportunism by Rennie. The Town centre-forward had just missed a giltedged chance provided by Daly, having only Webb to beat at two or three yards' range; then he chased to the goal line a loose pass from the left, and when tackled he gave Yardley a fine pass for the inside right to do the rest.

Webb made a number of fine saves both before and after this, and the Town forced many corners from which scrambles enwhile Drinnan nearly beat the custodian with a splendid header after a great effort by Daly. Then, shortly before the interval, following a scuffle in the Albien goalmouth, Fraser dashed through and struck the upright with a great shot. The Albion forwards got very few chances, so well did the Town halves and backs hold them in check, and the lead was well deserved when the teams crossed over.

The second half found the wind playing more tricks than ever, and there was less scientific football. The Albion showed some improvement, but could make little impression on the Town defence, and the best chance for a very long time came when Rennie missed the target with a fine first-timer, as everyone expected him to score from Yardley's pass. Daly also made another wonderful attempt that deserved to succeed, but did not.

It was nearing the end that the Albion

exerted pressure, and in a hot struggle in the Town goalmouth, Banes, Richards and Fraser in turn got the ball away when the goal seemed destined to fall. Quite as fortunate an escape was seen at the other end immediately afterwards, when Webb got in the way of a ball that struck Yardley's knee as he rushed in to meet McInnes' centre.

Banes had almost a holiday, and was quite safe. Richards played a glorious game, and Smith was a splendid partner. All the halves were on form and provided the forwards with the ball to best advantage. The attack was weak in front of goal, otherwise elever and speedy, with Drinnan a shining light in the matter of manipulation.
