LONDON IN THE LIME-LIGHT.—For many years the North has claimed pride of place in the football world. Until fairly recently, both the Challenge Cup and League honours usually found their abode north of the Trent, rarely visiting the Metropolis. To-day, however, London is much in the lime-light. True the Cup goes North once more, and Southerners will be amongst the first to congratulate Everton on the deserved success which crowns the heroic and brilliant achievements of three seasons, in which the Championship of both the senior divisions of the League has been won and the Cup brought to its present custody at Goodison Park. We salute Everton and acclaim their greatness.

Yet this has been a great season for London clubs. The supreme award has come once again, for the Championship flag will fly once more at Highbury. Few will deny that Arsenal have fully merited their success. The Gunners have added lustre to the brilliance of their recent record, and we join all their friends and neighbours in congratulation. Less sparkling, but almost as worthy, is the gaining of promotion by Tottenham Hotspur. Every foot of their progress has been fiercely contested, and by a curious irony they became assured of their success on the day of their defeat, for while the Spurs were "hammered" in the East End, Ful-

ham, whose fight has been full of gallant deeds, unexpectedly fell before the onslaught of Grimsby Town. As though these two events were insufficient to focus attention on the Metropolis, Chelsea must needs keep their friends and supporters on the tenter-hooks of anxiety to the very last, and West Ham, who had fought through to the semi-final in the Cup competition, only achieved safety in their last home game. Add to these considerations the fact that Charlton, whose optimism has remained unbounded, have been forced once more into the Third Division, and it becomes evident that Londoners are saying farewell to a season in which their clubs have maintained a strong grip on the attention and interest of all football enthusiasts.

NEARER HOME.—Our tale of London's conspicuous eminence is, however, by no means complete until we have placed our laurels at the feet of Brentford. Candour compels the admission that we wish ourselves where they stand—at the head of the table. This having been said, we yield to none in the sincerity of our congratulations. Our friends at Griffin Park have won their triumph by their consistency in the long campaign rather than by a series of brilliant victories offset by humiliating defeats. A strong defence has stood them in good stead. Both Reading and Coventry City have scored more goals than the "Bees"—the Midland team having reached the impressive total of 106—but neither club has been so successful in defence as the victors of the Division, who next season will appear in more exalted company.

NEARING THE END. In concluding 'Tales of the Glaziers' we may

recall our fortunes at the hands (or feet) of those to whom we yield precedence in the final table. We have shared the points with Brentford, Norwich and Exeter, while Reading has been compelled to concede three points for the one received at our expense. Coventry City have put us to confusion on two occasions, on one of which we received our worst drubbing for the present season.

These things are recalled that any tendency to undue pessimism may be effectually checked. This has not been by any means a good season for us, but we can still hold up our heads when we recall the measure we have meted to and received from our more successful rivals.

We owe the comparative lowliness of our position in the League Table to the fact that we have exhibited our worst form when confronted with the weaker clubs and for this fault we are heavily penalised. "A little more" would have meant "much" on many occasions and we have only ourselves to blame that we are not hot on the heels of Brentford at the present moment.

Our last 'away' match brought us a welcome and merited victory. A good deal was at stake for Newport County, who needed to win in order to escape the indignity of a renewed application for admission to the ranks of their present Division. The home team went all out for victory, from the very start of the game. Their play lacked method and finish, hence its vigour was neutralised, for they

happened to meet our defence when it was at its best. Barrie was in great form and gave an altogether admirable show of pivotal play. Many of the fiercest attacks of the County were broken up or frustrated by our centre-half—whose clever positioning and deadly tackling stood us in the best stead. Barrie and his colleagues kept well in touch with their forwards, who were all in a happy vein, adapting themselves cleverly to conditions and swinging the ball in a succession of well conceived ground passes. Simpson was full of wiles. He and TURNER had a merry afternoon, the latter claiming two of our triad of goals. WALTERS securing the third. Newport failed to take the hint contained in our play and continued to rely on 'finesse' so we had little difficulty in keeping them at bay and limiting their success to a solitary goal notched by GARDINER—who has been an effective marksman lately.

THE LESS THAT IS SAID. "The less said, the better" applies to the match between our Reserves and those of Chelsea. The words would be inappropriate if we wrote of the "Tales of the Pensioners," who were in good form. We seldom looked like scoring, for our work was disjointed and scrappy. Turnbull was a lonely figure as he continued to display soundness—albeit even he was not at his best. That Chelsea, aided as they were by such players as O'Dell, Pearson, and Chitty—retired victors, with a couple of goals to their credit is about in accord with the run of the play. They held the upper hand throughout.

LUTON TOWN, who will be seen at Selhurst Park this afternoon, are old friends and rivals of the Palace, and there have been many fine struggles between the two clubs. The "Strawplaiters" have a clever and lively forward line which will doubtless keep our defence fully extended. A glance at the league table will show that they have scored more goals than our lads, but their position lower down the table must be due to the increased number against. We shall expect to see our forward line to-day finding the weak spot, and hope for a win and possible lift to fifth position on the table.

It will be remembered that our old goalkeeper Jim Imrie is with Luton Town, and in his second season there. He got his place in their first team in the second match last season, because George Harford had his shoulder dislocated at Reading. Jim played in every match, League and Cup-tie afterwards, and then in his third game this season he met with the same misfortune that befell Harford, and Harford regained his old place again.
