Stephenson almost got through within a few seconds of the start, while Ball, Roberts and Martin all had good efforts well saved by Hillam, and Crompton only just failed to beat the goalkeeper with a first-time shot.

THE Orient, without showing brilliance, worked tremendously hard, and often gave the Town defence anxious moments. once they got the ball in the net for what appeared to be a legitimate goal, but the referee held that the scorer had propelled the ball with his arm, and promptly disallowed the point. Just before the changeover Stephenson again had hard luck with a shot that struck the upright.

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THAYNE gave a much better display at half, and Smith was ubiquitous as ever. Colquhoun was skilful in his service to the forwards, but was often lacking in pace against a quick wing. Kingham gave a splendid display, quite his best of the season, and Mackey was a steady partner, with Coen safe as usual.

FOR the Orient, Hillam kept goal well, and his backs presented a grim problem to the Town attack. They kicked and tackled fiercely, and were just as relentless when three goals behind as before there was a score. The halves were much the same, and the forwards were willing to give and take anything the Toyre defenders give and take anything the Town defenders could do. There was good team spirit and plenty of energy, even if the combination of the visitors did not reach the standard of the Town.
