FISHER eventually opened the score for the visitors, following clever combination by the inside forwards, the centre-forward running clean through the defence to give Coen not a shadow of a chance. After the Town had missed opportunities of drawing level, Watson struck the upright when Coen was beaten and Nackey cleared from the goal-line. Mackey saved his side two or three times by his cool defensive play.

MARTIN equalised with a brilliant goal following bright work in conjunction with Boyd and Roberts, the inside-right slipping into position to receive from Boyd and beating Holland with a magnificent shot which the goalkeeper hardly saw. On level terms again, both teams strove hard to get the lead before the interval, but the defences held out, and, at the cross-over, there was nothing to choose between the teams. teams.

GILLINGHAM had the better of the game again after the change, but they could not get in shots at close-quarters, and, when the Town had their turn, the finishing was again sadly lacking in promptitude and shooting power. Play ran from end to end, but with the Town keeping the ball too close, the visitors were always the more dancerous, and Coen made the the more dangerous, and Coen made the better saves.

HOWEVER, Boyd had very hard luck when a shot knocked out the goalkeeper, and another laid out a defender, but the ball was got away. Gillingham, after their Scalkeeper had resumed, but in strong work, and several times went close before they took the lead through DONCASTER, who took full toll of an easy opening.

LUTON, who had to rearrange their side owing to Mackey being hurt, made strenuous efforts to draw level, and again and again attacked, but Gillingham defended gamely, and defied all efforts. In the last few minutes, the Town frequently
