Stephenson, showing something of a re-vival, scored first, and 'ere doing so he had a shot strike one upright, flash across goal and hit the other, and come out. Payne

Ball netted with a simple header from Hodge's centre and two minutes later took a crack at the ball from the edge of the penalty area and saw it swerve just inside the post, these two coming quickly after the interval.

Hodge notched the last goal just before the end after a long period in which Luton

had been little more than strolling players. City's defence was strong and hardy and fought tenaciously, if not artistically. Wilson did wonders and his backs were stubborn. Pearce was a fit companion.

The forwards were workers without assistance, Dryden being the best. Luton's work was methodical, clever and speedy. With better finishing they could have taken double figures. There was little to choose,

though Stephenson's improvement was notable. Finlayson and Fellowes were sixth and seventh forwards, and Nelson's

defensive tactics were better than his indulgence in dribbling. Smith was a fine back, and Dolman a more or less prominent
