MAKING fullest possible allowance for the wretched conditions it must be confessed that LUTON TOWN did not fulfil the hopes of their supporters on Saturday apart from the fact that they got both points. #### ONLY IN SPASMS

The Town players were sometimes little better than a rabble, without understand-ing, with no idea of position play, and as far as the forwards were concerned, little combination. Well it was for the Town that Tom Smith was wise to this move early on, or the visitors might have gained a lead that would have won the match.

### THE USUAL

The Town's goal was scored by PAYNE, and a grand effort it was. Stephenson made it possible by racing for a ball that looked like going out of play, and centreing perfectly; Payne dashed through the crowd and headed into the net as cut and thrust after this, and although the Town had longer periods of attack than the visitors, the Bournemouth raids were well executed, and but for their inside forwards playing too much the W formation they might have drawn level.

## BACKS DO WELL

Coen made a magnificent save when Riley was clean through and shot grandly, and Smith's defensive work was brilliant. Frequently he sent his forwards to the attack after holding up the opposition, and although not so prominent, Mackey also had his moments, once clearing gloriously when Chalmers was right through. Another factor that upset the Town forwards was the offside strategy of the Bournemouth backs. They had the Town forwards held up again and again by shrewd moving forward as soon as the ball was cleared or if a Town player held the ball for a second longer than he should have done.

#### A NARROW ESCAPE

Just before the interval each goal narrowly escaped, for Parris once centred just too high for Riley to reach the ball

Roberts', who was doing great things in midfield, had a grand chance soon after the restart, but went close in and then lifted the ball high over the bar. It was not until the last quarter of an hour and we had the Town attacking again as they had done at the start. Be-



fore this there had been a few attacks and both Hodge and Payne went close, but suddenly there came a series of efforts which provided gilt-edged opportunities. The Bournemouth goalkeeper saved his charge in brilliant fashion two or three times, and Payne was just wide with a tremendous shot.

The best chance came when Payne sent right across goal and Stephenson collected the ball only a yard or two from goal; he sent it against the goalkeeper's body, and Roberts failed to turn it through.

There was one occasion just before this when Roberts dribbled to within three or four yards of goal, and was tripped; he kept his feet and the appeal for a penalty kick was ignored, though there was an obvious offence, and the foul just turned the scales in favour of the visitors and they cleared after a scramble.

Bournemouth were game to the end, and they forced a corner in the last few seconds, but the ball was cleared and was in mid-field when the whistle sounded.

I knew Coen would not let the side down. He was safe as the Bank of England—perhaps safer. Mackey was not always happy in the first half, but played confidently in the second, and Smith again showed what a grand defender he is. Bournemouth backs were good, but had nothing on Smith, who made only one error of note in the match, and that was when he dribbled down from the corner flag and was robbed. Nevertheless he and Mackey placed the ball splendidly to their forwards.

Nelson played strongly though he ventured up the field rather a lot in the second half, and left something of a gap for Riley. Finlayson and Fellowes again were grand half-backs, and the former played probably his best game of the season. He seemed to have found a bit of pace from somewhere. Both he and Fellows knew what to do with the ball.

#### FORWARDS

Roberts was the star forward from the view of constructive work. He was grand in all except his marksmanship, and of that the least said the better. If he could only shoot well he would be as valuable as any player, and he is certainly a grand worker. Payne was the most dangerous as usual, though at times a bit slow in getting the ball on the move; when he was near goal he was as quick as any opponent could want him to be. Ball roamed about a lot, and Stephenson faded after a hard first half, while Hodge was below his best. Conditions were a good excuse up to a point, but there will have to be other goal scorers besides Payne if the team is to retain the leadership.

#### THE VISITORS

Mellors was none too comfortable in the Bournemouth goal, although he made heroic saves. I liked King rather better than Bellis because he was a bit faster to the tackle. The halves were all triers, and Lawrence did many clever things, while Pincott was a tower of strength as a defensive half. The forwards made many nice moves, and Chalmers and Parris were a clever wing.
