When in the first half Northampton had the wind behind them and no goals accrued, the Luton contingent had good reason for being satisfied with the position. It must have been a shock to the visiting supporters when steadily but surely Northampton, having beaten off some preliminary attacks by Luton, took the game in hand, and, completely outstaying their opponents, finished as definite masters of the situation.

Not for many a day has a Northampton team shown greater ability. The side was well balanced, the defence made scarcely a mistake, and the attack was wholehearted and cleverly constructive, the wing halves lending fine support to the men

in front.

Luton, on the other hand, were a little uneven. Their experiment in bringing young Stevens in at outside-left was not a success. He did a few good things, but seemed nonplussed after failure to accept an opportunity early in the second half.

Thayne generally had Ball well covered, while Payne was also in the main kept in subjection. It was 10 minutes after the interval that Rawlings opened the scoring from a brilliant movement in which Riches and Tolland also had a share.

Payne equalised a quarter of an hour later, but almost before the game was going again, Rawlings, repeating his earlier movement of cutting diagonally to the goalmouth, restored Northampton's lead. It was after several great saves by Coen that Lyman cut in from the other flank to complete the scoring.
