MELLOR (Manchester United) and McAulay (Chelsea) will not readily forget their first game for Cardiff City as full-backs.

Luton made a grand revival, yet from the manner of their onslaughts at the start Cardiff looked potential winners, for they were the more dangerous and twice nearly
