There was plenty of excitement in a game of many fluctuations, but for the most part the defences were superior to the forwards, until the game was well advanced.

Orient should have been in front at the interval, for they had plenty of good scoring chances. Apart from that, Searle failed with a penalty kick given for hands against Fellowes.

Searle's shot was a very feeble one, and Coen had the easiest of tasks to go down to the ball and scrape it away.

The Orient's raids in this half were more frequent than those of Luton, but when the Luton forwards did get going they looked the more dangerous attacking force.

Up to the interval Payne was so well marked by Affleck that he seldom looked like adding to his big bag of goals.

Seven minutes had passed in the second period when Payne put Luton ahead with a goal which was a tribute

to his opportunism.

Dawes did not play a conspicuous part, and he could not get in any of those storming shots for which he was famous when he wore the Palace colours, but he paved the way for Luton's second goal, scored by Stephen-

Stephenson, at outside left, took chief honour among the wingers. He always knew a trick too many for Taylor and Searle, and his goal just before the end was grand. Taking the ball along as if tied to his toes he beat man after man and wound up with a beautiful drive that beat Hillam completely.

Joe Payne did not always have his own way with Affleck, who, with Hearty, the left back, were the best of the home defenders.

The forwards dallied too much, their short-passing style being entirely unsuit-

able for the heavy going. Searle nad a chance of giving Orient the lead in the first half, but failed with a penalty and Luton were too good after-
