#### GREAT GOALKEEPER

We have seen good goalkeeping this season, thanks to the safety fence that has hedged the goal, but I am quite con-vinced that we have not seen a better custodian than Burke.

say of Burke that his coolness and sound udgment were the features of his play; he never lost his bearings, but marked the prospective flight of the ball so well that he folled some of the best shooting Millwalls backs and halves worked splendidly in the first half, and even when they were domed to defeat they never ceased trying, but they were almost run off their feet after change of ends, and the stamina of the Town team was remarkable.
