Millwall's first-half exhibition, if not so menacing after the interval, was quite attractive, the passing being accurate and extending to the full a solid defence.

In the second half it was another story. Millwall's defence could not hold a masterful attack backed by forcing halves. Only the brilliance of Burke, Inns, and Wallbanks prevented twice as many goals. The "Lions" were too spasmodic a force to threaten to any great measure the Luton goal, and long before the end they were a baffled and well-beaten pack.

Hancock scored the only goal of the first half after Burke had saved in marvellous fashion from Stephenson.

Roberts added a second smashing goal just after the restart, then Payne fired in a penalty kick, which Burke saved grandly but could not get the ball clear. Payne promptly netted.
