LUTON HAVE NO WEAK LINK

NO. Your eyesight is not failing you. The score is 5—0, and you must hand the palm to Luton, the really 100 per cent. Third Division side. Although they were playing against a slightly weakened Millwall side—Brolly, Barker and Mangnall were missing—their perfect positioning and extreme calm in every emergency was amazing.

Millwall, on the other hand, never settled down. Was it because the main cog was missing? I think so. Mangnall is not only a great player these days but he's also a general.

A bit hard on Millwall that while they were having slightly the better of the play Hancock met a cross pass from Stephenson on the run-in and opened the score for Luton.

Then Millwall had another good spell, but their weakness in the centre spoilt many good movements. Their smartest attacker was Smith (J. R.) on the right wing, whose duels with full back King were a feature.

Up to the interval, Payne was overshadowed by the diminutive Wallbanks, and Luton only just deserved their half-time lead of a goal.

In the second half, however, there was a different tale to tell. It opened sensationally. Smith made a fine run through for Millwall and Coen saved remarkably well. Immediately the tide turned. Luton hit back and Millwall's worries became worse when left half Forsyth, who had taken several hard knocks on the head, appeared to be playing in a daze. Once he had to leave the field for attention.

SECOND TIME LUCKY

Payne had now got the measure of Wallbanks, and, neatly fed by Fellowes, he was able to give Roberts, the inside left, the pass that brought the second goal. Roberts neatly side-stepped and put in a shot which was helped into the net by a defender.

Luton came again. Smith, Millwall's right back, handled in the fateful area. Payne took the kick. Burke stopped his first shot, but the Luton leader ran in to make sure at the second attempt.

Stephenson put on the fourth and Luton's power at half back was amply demonstrated when Finlayson, their right half, scored the fifth—this was his first League goal for them.

Just before the end, Millwall's left back, Inns, was taken off with an injured foot.
