COST LUTON TOWN THE POINTS

LUTON TOWN failed badly in their home game with TOTTENHAM HOTSPUR. In spite of the fact that the home team had much the better of the general exchanges, there was lacking that unity of effort that had marked previous games, and the defence broke down badly through sheer lack of understanding between Coen and his co-defenders.

PLAY WAS FAIRLY EVEN in the first PLAY WAS FAIRLY EVEN in the first half, with the Spurs goalkeeper having more work than Coen, but the visiting defence was stubborn, and quick tackling and hard kicking gave their forwards plenty of openings for raids. On the whole, however, the Town forwards were the more aggressive, and again and again had the Spurs' defence hard pressed, and there was much kicking out of play. of play.

REDFERN opened the score for the Town after thirty minutes, seizing a chance following a well-placed free kick, and tricking the goalkeeper very cleverly before putting the ball into the net. Griffiths only just failed to get a goal a minute or two later, and then the Spurs went away, and, following a mixup in the Town defence, MILLER equalised with a hard shot as Coen left his charge. his charge.

MORRISON put the Spurs ahead immediately afterwards, getting a clear run through while the Town defenders stood appealing for offside. The Spurs had to defend stubbornly during the remaining period before the change-over, and they were fortunate to see their goal escape.

LUTON RESUMED VERY STRONGLY, and attack after attack was fiercely launched, but the resistance continued be very stubborn, and appeals for penalties were ignored. Eventually REDFERN brought the scores level with a brilliant effort after cleverly beating Fullwood.

AFTER FURTHER PRESSURE by the Town, the defence again let down the side very badly, for a free kick to the Spurs was uncovered by any Luton player, and the Spurs inside forwards were left with only Coen to beat, and MORRISON had no trouble to score.
