SPLENDI') CHANCES were missed by the Bury centre-forward, Smith, who went clean through the defence and had only

Dolman to beat. From a difficult angle he shot outside, but later. from a position right in 'ront of goal, he sent the ball high over when he should have scored easily.

LUTON RESUMED the second half with strong pressure, and Ferguson made good saves, and several corners were forced, the Town left wing being prominent. Ferguson and his backs dealt with all the corner that war had severed the result war. came their way, but good chances were missed by Redfern and Griffiths.

FROM A BREAKAWAY by the visiting left wing the ball was sent into the middle and BARGH, taking a pot shot minute and BARGH, taking a pot shot from twenty-five yards, beat Dolman to score the only goal of the match. The goalkeeper went down to the ball, but failed to capture it, and it passed underneath his body into the net.

LUTON MADE DESPERATE EFFORTS, and Payne want to centre-forward, Redfern moving to inside-right. Despite all their endeavours, and the fact that they were pressing har i for long periods, they falled to beat down a sturdy defence.

DOLMAN had little to do, although he made a couple of good saves. Mackey was not so sure as usual, but Smith and Nelson put up a strong resistance. Loughran was successful as deputy for Finlayson, and Fellowes played hard all the time, and was a potent figure in

THE FORWARDS were not well together. Redfern failed as a marksman, and was usually closured by the hefty Matthewson. Payne worked tremendously hard and Griffiths and Stephenson did good work in spasms, but Hogg was not so quick and effective, although he was none too well treated by opponents.

BURY were very sound in defence, and Matthewson was a stalwart pivot, getting through an immense amount of work, while Bell and Gemmell kicked and tackled resolutely, and Ferguson was a safe custodian.

THE VISITING WINGERS were speedy and clever, but the inside forwards made few scoring chances, and were not of the same standard, or, perhaps it would be better to ay that the Town defenders held them too well.
