TWO GOALS IN TWO MINUTES MID-WAY THROUGH THE FIRST HALF gave LUTON TOWN the upper hand at PLY-MOUTH, and they ran out worthy winners, although the Argyle twice reduced the lead before the Town made the issue safe with a fourth goal twenty minutes from the and the end.

THE ARGYLE WERE HANDICAPPED by an injury to Cann, their goalkeeper, who suffered a damaged leg in a collision with Stephenson in the early stages. He did not resume after the interval, but the work of the Town forwards was so good, that even after taking this misfortune into consideration, Plymouth were a well beaten team. beaten team.

THE TOWN'S FORM WAS A REVELATION after the dreary displays of the
two previous Saturdays, and the new formation of the forward line proved an
unqualified success. Dawes proved his
versatility—he has played in every position in the forward line—by giving a
great display at outside-right, and three
of the goals came as a direct result of
his work.

HIS CENTRES WERE BRILLIANTLY PLACED, but he was only one of the good units in a forward line that played some class football. The line moved smoothly and well, and the ball was kept on the move in a manner that proved disconcerting to the Argyle defenders. Ably led by Vinall, they broke through time and again, and four goals did not flatter them.

VINALL AGAIN REACHED THE LIMELIGHT by his untiring efforts, while Roberts came back to his best, and gave a clever and hard-working display. He emulated his Southampton feat by scoring twice, and his first goal was one of the best seen this season. Stephenson was not quite so successful, but much of his work was excellent.

PAYNE GOT HIS NAME IN THE SCOR-ING LIST again, and proved an effective partner for Dawes, although the pace began to tell on him before the end finlayson and Nelson were outstanding in the middle line, with Fellowes a little behind, but not quite touching his best. Nelson resumed his tussles with Bourton, and as in the past, came out on top.

MACKEY'S RE-APPEARANCE WAS AMPLY JUSTIFIED, and he seemed to put more backbone into the defence. His hefty kleking and hard tackling were much appreciated, and he is evidently the best man for the job. Smith took time to get the measure of Morgan, but he shut the winger out for the most part. His kleking was good. It looked at if Dolman



might have saved the second goal, but apart from that, his keeping was faultless.

EARLY PLAY FAVOURED THE TOWN, and for the first ten minutes or so, Plymouth were forced on the defensive. They settled down, and appeared the more dangerous side for a time. Then ROBERTS took advantage of a brilliant move by Vinall and Dawes to run on and give Cann no chance with a great rising shot.

TWO MINUTES LATER, Cann could only fist out a centre from Dawes, and PAYNE crashed the ball into the net to put the Town two up. Nine minutes later, VINALL drew a bow at a venture from long range, and the ball went sailing into the net with Cann making no effort to save. It transpired that the goalkeeper's injury was the reason for this,

LUTON WERE SO MUCH ON TOP that it was a surprise when VIDLER reduced the lead just before the interval. He was sent away with a delightful through pass, and gave Dolman no chance with shot into the top corner of the net.

THE TOWN BEGAN THE SECOND HALF
with a series of attacks, and then came
an amazing rally by the Argyle. Although
they were a forward short, they piled
on the pressure, and FLETCHER reduced
the lead with a hard drive from a grand
pass from Wright. For a time the Town
defence had to work overtime, and only
a great save by Dolman prevented an
equaliser when Fletcher again shot.

GRADUALLY. HOWEVER, LUTON GAINED the upper hand again, and the forwards moved up in line for Dawes to centre neatity. Stephenson turned the ball inside to ROBERTS, who beat Kirkwood, the deputy goalkeeper, with a low drive. From this point to the end, it was all Luton, and Kirkwood had plenty of opportunity to demonstrate his goalkeeping ability. He did very well to keep out several shots.
