Scarborough Miss Two Golden Chances

VINALL AND DAWES SCORE FIRST HALF GOALS

Second half of the football season is always the more strenuous for those clubs still holding an interest in the F.A. Cup competition, or with a fair chance of promotion, or with the gloomy prospect of relegation.

Luton Town have not a great deal of scope for hope or fear in regard to their League position, but to-day were concerned with a Cup-tie which meant a good deal to the club, at least financially.

Exempt from the earlier rounds, they had to visit one of the smaller fry remaining in the competition at the third round last Saturday, and they failed to shake off the plucky Scarborough challenge.

Result was that Scarborough were visitors to Luton to-day for a re-play, and they had let it be known up north that they were confident of holding Luton in this second game.

SCARBOROUGH'S LIVELY START

Scarborough won the this and were first to break through on the left, Mackey being beaten simply by the left wing. Smith came over and got the ball away and the Town made progress on the right where Finlayson's pass was too speedy for Ferguson.

A free kick was given against Burke for fouling Mackey. The latter placed the ball well, but the visitors got it away. The first incident of note was a flying left shot from Ferguson, which came right across goal, and Robinson allowed it to go wide.

At once we saw the Town start fiddling about instead of getting on with the ball to the right wing, Dawes and Ferguson each being at fault.

Scarborough promptly got away from the kick-off, Mitchell being the inspira-tion of the movement and he sent the right wing through, but Coen dashed out cleverly and baulked Agar as the winger bored in.

More fiddling about on the Town right wing again enabled Scarborough to break through, but Smith cleared with a good header and then Coen caught a long shot from Burke.

When the Town got back, through the agency of a free kick, Roberts shot wide from 20 yards. Tom Smith came up and gave the right wing a good pass, but Dawes could not get his feet out of the mud quickly enough, and his shot was blocked.

Ferguson got over a centre just afterwards, but again the shot was blocked and a moment later Mackey shot wide from 40 yards.

TOWN LIVENING UP

There was a loud appeal for hands against one of the visitors as he stopped a shot from Ferguson. This was nega-tived, but the Town were now livening up a bit and play was in the Scarborough half continuously.

Smith was doing exceptionally well by sending the ball among the forwards every time. This was the right policy. Roberts was badly fouled by Jolly, but from the free kick the right wing pair was offside.

A burst by the visiting forwards beat the Town defence. Burke had every chance, but like other forwards he was too long in getting in his shot and Mackey got up and turned the ball behind for a flag kick.

This was got away. The dribbling by the Town forwards was playing directly into the hands of the Scarborough defenders. They were not content to beat one man, but they wanted to beat the whole team.

Mackey came through the middle with the ball and gave Ferguson a pass, himself going forward for the return, which the winger failed to give.

Scarborough defenders, like most others that have been to Luton, could give the Town defence points in the wcking of the offside rule, and twice within a few minutes they jockeyed the Town attack offside.

A moment later clever work along the line enabled Dawes to race and meet with his head a fine centre from Ferguson, but Robinson brought off a brilliant save at full length.

For a minute or two we had something like a little bombardment of the Scarborough goal, but the ball was got and the Town goal was saved by Smith when everything seemed lost.

The visiting left wing broke clean through and from his shot Nicol turned the ball in past Coen, but Smith flew up from nowhere and kicked out.
