Straight from the clearance, the ball was lunged forward to LAKE, and he caught Nelson on the wrong foot, and went right through to beat Coen with a fine drive.

LUTON'S LEFT WING payed the Way for another fierce onslaught on the City.

THREE MINUTES LATER there was a similar move, and Nelson was again unable to show any pace, and LAKE darked through to accept a pass from the left wing, and put the City three goals up.

LUTON PRESSED HOTLY, and Ferguson shot in splendidly, but Morgan, at full length, managed to turn the ball round the post. Roberts was stopped by the handling of a City defender, but the referee was unsighted. The Town stormed the City goal, but all to no purpose, and Redfern failed when he had a good chance.

ANOTHER SHARP RAID by the City

ANOTHER SHARP RAID by the City brought quick, short passing in front of goal, and LAKE secured and managed to get the ball past Coen, and it struck the upright, and glanced into the net, putting the City four goals up at the end of twenty-three minutes.

LAKE nearly added a fifth just afterwards. Coen saving grandly at full length, and shortly afterwards he was damaged when he went down at full length to gather a ball with Lake rushing in to intercept.

WHEN THE CITY BROKE AWAY again, Taylor missed a very easy chance from close range by shooting tamely behind. There followed another terrific assault on the City goal, and Payne and

Roberts, in turn, had hard luck with splendid efforts. Corner after corner followed, and the City goal escaped in miraculous fashion.

LUTON WERE AT IT AGAIN as soon as the game was resumed after the interval, and after lively exchanges in the first minute with the City defence, they were awarded a penalty kick, as Metcalf was adjudged to have handled. PAYNE took the spot kick and scored easily.

APART FROM OCCASIONAL RAIDS little was seen of the City attack, and play was in the City half nearly all the time Redfern missed very badly again by allowing the goalkeeper time to rush out and cover the shot when he had plenty of time and space at which to shoot.

MASON AND FRITH together dashed at Redfern as the latter was dribbling, and they crashed, Mason having to be assisted from the field with a gashed forehead. Luton were right on top, but could do nothing right in front of goal.

CORNER AFTER CORNER was forced, and with the defence playing better than at any previous stage of the game. The City packed their goal, and the Town forwards failed to make a direct and quick shot when the ball came their way, but it would not run kindly for them, and they had to retire defeated.

LUTON'S DEFENCE was lacking unity in the City's brilliant spell. There were big gaps down the middle, and Lake was given far too much scope, especially after Nelson was damaged. The backs failed to give the necessary cover, and Coen, who played brilliantly and could never be faulted, was given no chance with any scoring shot.

CARTE'S INEXPERIENCE.

CARTE'S INEXPERIENCE was obvious in the early stages; but he recovered to play a very useful game in the second half. Lutterloch, too, was some time in settling down, but there was none better in defence after the interval, and if the first half had been marked with the same judgment and determination, the City would not have scored a winning lead so quickly.

NELSON SUFFERED BADLY from the strain, and was at fault to the extent that he allowed Lake to get on the wrong side of him in the first half.
