Finnicking Forwards And Shaky Defence

Lution Town have gathered one point of a possible six from their Easter programme. That way lies relegation, but there is still a spiendid chance of escape provided the team can rise to the occasion in the next two home games.

Play will have to be sharpened up considerably, however, if Swansea and Newcastle are to be defeated, and one hardly dare hope for success in the other engagement at Norwich.

In none of the three games played this Eastertide has the team played up to the standard required. At Nottingham on Friday the defence did very well indeed, but was shaky and unreliable at Fulham on Saturday, and very little better in the home game on Easter Monday.

Difference between the Town defence and others is the quality of the covering up and the ability to recover among the halves—the faculty of perpetual motion such as was shown by the Forest half-backs, who never ceased from fighting for the ball.

Nevertheless, the chief blame for losses must be placed with the forwards, and especially the inside forwards, who could work the ball shrough again and ugain and then fail badly. Lack of thrust and thoroughness and of finishing power generally were the deplorable features, and these must be remedied if the Club is to escape relegation.

Individual criticism must be discounted at this time, but if the distinctions must be made, Coen on Friday, Dolman on Monday, Nelson in all games and Stephenson should be exempt from criticism, because they showed the right spirit and reached a standard which, if not toe good for the Second Division, was certainly good enough to win matches.
