attack, a phase of the game to which

DOLMAN SAVED SEVERAL SHOTS that looked certain to find a billet in the net, and played his part manfully in keeping the score sheet clean before the interval. He appeared to make a mistake when the first goal was scored, but the ball was going away from him, and actually he did well to get down to it.

CONNELLY WAS THE STAR OF THE FRONT LINE, and his clever play was a feature of the game. He had his best match since joining the Town, and on this form will be a decided asset. Carroll received a bad ankle injury 15 minutes before the end, but previously had been none too impressive, although he did better in the second half than before the interval. the interval.

ROBERTS AND STEPHENSON DID NOT GET TOGETHER in quite the old way, and the inside man was not often disposed to hold the ball. He did any amount of work, as usual, and tried hard for a goal. Stephenson put across some good centres, but generally was not at his best. Vinall kept pegging away, and was unlucky to have a goal disallowed in the first half.

THE FIRST GOAL CAME NINE MINUTES after the interval when Sankey hit the ball right across the field to Johnson, who took it on and centred for JONES to head through. The lead was increased by BURGIN, who was presented with a simple chance after the ball had bobbed about in front of the goal for some time. time some

THE NEAREST LUTON CAME TO SCORING was when Stephenson hit the woodwork. A couple of appeals for penalties were unheeded, but the Town made strenuous efforts for a goal, despite the fact that they were a man short. The scoring was completed three minutes from the end when JONES scrambled the ball through following a corner.
